Patricia M. KIM is an expert on Chinese foreign policy, U.S.-China relations, and East Asian security issues. She is a senior policy analyst at the U.S. Institute of Peace where her portfolio includes topics ranging from U.S.-China strategic competition and China's Belt and Road Initiative, to North Korea and U.S. alliances in East Asia. She recently directed the China-Red Sea Senior Study Group at USIP which examined China's activities and influence in the Horn of Africa and the Arabian Peninsula. Dr. Kim is also a non-resident Global Fellow at the Woodrow Wilson Center, a Visiting Scholar at Columbia's School of International and Public Affairs, and a term member of the Council on Foreign Relations. Her writings have been published widely in outlets such as

Foreign Affairs, Foreign Policy, International Security, The South China Morning Post, and The Washington Post. She frequently briefs U.S. government officials in her areas of expertise and has testified before the House Intelligence Committee and the House Foreign Affairs Subcommittee on Terrorism, Nonproliferation, and Trade. Dr. Kim received her doctoral degree from the Department of Politics at Princeton University and her bachelor's degree with highest distinction in political science and Asian studies from the University of California, Berkeley. She is fluent in Mandarin Chinese and Korean, and proficient in Japanese.

Joel WUTHNOW is a senior research fellow in the Center for the Study of Chinese Military Affairs within the Institute for National for Strategic Studies at National Defense University. His research areas include Chinese foreign and security policy, Chinese military affairs, U.S.-China relations, and strategic developments in East Asia. In addition to his duties in INSS, he also serves as an adjunct professor in the Edmund A. Walsh School of Foreign Service at Georgetown University. Prior to joining NDU, Dr. Wuthnow was a China analyst at CNA, a postdoctoral fellow in the 'China and the World' Program at Princeton University, and a pre-doctoral fellow at The Brookings Institution. Dr. Wuthnow holds degrees from Princeton University (A.B., summa cum



laude, in Public and International Affairs), Oxford University (M.Phil. in Modern Chinese Studies), and Columbia University (Ph.D. in Political Science). He is proficient in Mandarin.



Hema NARANG has recently submitted her doctoral dissertation at the Centre for East Asian Studies, School of International Studies, Jawaharlal Nehru University. Pursuing her undergraduate in Political Science from Lady Shri Ram College, Delhi University and Masters in International Relations from JNU, she has also worked as a Legislative Assistant for Members of Parliament in New Delhi. Her MPhil research delineated the broad contours of Chinese and Indian engagements in Africa while the central thrust of the doctoral research is to examine the growing soft power capabilities of China and India in Africa. She has also been the recipient of the Harvard Yenching Institute-Harvard Centre for Africa Studies (HYI-CAS) Fellowship, 2019-20.

Jean-Pierre CABESTAN is Professor at the Department of Government and International Studies at Hong Kong Baptist University. He is also associate researcher at the Asia Centre, Paris and at the French Centre for Research on Contemporary China, Hong Kong. His main themes of research are Chinese politics and law, China's foreign and security policies, China-Africa relations, China-Taiwan relations and Taiwanese politics. His most recent publications include *Political Changes in Taiwan Under Ma Ying-jeou. Partisan Conflict, Policy Choices, External Constraints and Security Challenges* (co-edited with Jacques deLisle), Abingdon, Oxon & New York: Routledge, 2014; *Tanzania-China All-Weather Friendship in the Era of Multipolarity*, (with



Jean-Raphaël Chaponnière), Saarbrücken: Lambert Academic Publishing, 2017 and *China Tomorrow: Democracy or Dictatorship?*, Lanham, MD: Rowman & Littlefield, 2019. He received his Ph.D. from the University of Paris 1 (Panthéon-Sorbonne).
